
First cohort begin new innovative VetSkill programme

The first learners in Myerscough's new veterinary nursing qualification have been working on their study programme.

The VetSkill qualification delivers a Level 3 programme, and is designed for students to have a better balance between practical and theoretical elements than the previous curriculum offered.

VetSkill is an Ofqual and CCEA approved awarding organisation, a professional regulatory body and an ifATE and ESFA approved end point assessment organisation who approve Myerscough College to deliver their qualification.

On 13th September, 1999, the first cohort of students began a range of programmes at a centre situated within in the Victorian walled garden of the Park, surrounded by more than 500 acres of parkland.

This provided a unique setting, equipped with excellent practical facilities to study land-based subjects, just five miles from the heart of Liverpool City Centre.

The Croxteth centre quickly become one of the top land-based colleges in the Merseyside area, and over the years, facilities gradually expanded, including a state-of-the-art Animal and Equine Studies Centre, which was officially opened in 2019.

Myerscough and M-Sport have long been at the forefront when it comes to improving the prospects of talented youngsters with aspirations of a career in motorsport.

For several years, Myerscough students worked with the Cumbrian squad as part of their FIA Junior World Rally Championship and MSA British Rally Championship teams – getting a practical insight into the detail at motorsport's highest level.

The partnership offers unique, sector leading enrichment opportunities students studying for degrees in Motorsport Competition Car Technology and Motorsport Management and Logistics, including work placements based at the company's HQ in Cockermouth, Cumbria.

Student and staff delegates representing colleges and universities from the UK, present oral and poster presentations covering a vast range of topics, and in addition, a range of keynote speakers from both a scientific and industry background offer their experience, and guidance.

The trip gave the group the opportunity to go out on the boats to see sharks and whales in the wild, have lectures on shark conservation, took part in a beach clean, helped with the animals at a local shelter, got involved in community projects, and visited a big cat sanctuary.

Myerscough foundation learners continue to thrive on Supported Internships

A scheme aimed at getting young people who need extra help to move into employment, run by Myerscough College's Foundation Learning department, continues to go from strength to strength.

Supported Internships can have a huge impact, not only on the life outcomes of the interns who take part, but on the host organisation and wider society too.

Students go on placement two days a week to build on their employability skills and prepare them for future employment or work experience.

Supported Internships are work-based study programme where students with an EHCP (Educational Health Care Plan), and between ages of 16-25 are gaining the employability skills they need to be work ready.

Internships normally last for one year and they include a work placement. Students complete a personalised Study Programme working towards a qualification, usually 'Employability Skills'. Maths and English are also delivered as an important element.

The conference was split into three main areas, promoting the whole concept of research and its essential part it plays in Myerscough's learning experience.

Mere Plantations are a UK based company with more than 15-years-experience in reafforestation of degraded forest land.

It's estimated Myerscough's training in Ghana will allow a doubling of the productivity of local staff, as they proudly work towards their qualifications, and help to further grow green jobs with practical learning activities, and build confidence and abilities.

Myerscough College Celebrating Success



Will Still

Former Myerscough College and University Centre football student, Will Still, became the youngest Head Coach in any of Europe's top leagues, when he took charge at Stade de Reims, in French Ligue 1, at the age of just 30, in October 2022.

Born in Belgium to English parents, Will played both amateur and semi-professional football in Belgium, and after finishing school there, he initially tried a university course in physiotherapy, but realised that wasn't a career path he wished to pursue, before moving to England to be part of University Centre Myerscough's foundation degree study programme in Football Coaching and Performance.

After graduating, Will's career began to take off as he returned to Belgium and worked on Yannick Ferrera's technical staff at Sint-Truiden as a video analyst, helping them to gain promotion to the top tier of Belgian football in their first season together.

He then moved to Standard de Liège with Ferrera, winning the Belgian Cup with them in 2016. In 2017, Will was appointed caretaker manager of Lierse, in the Belgian second division, at just 24 years old, before becoming the club's full time manager.

Will then worked on Hernan Losada's staff at Beerschot, where they were promoted to the Belgian first division in 2020. Upon Losada's departure to the MLS, Will was appointed manager, making him the youngest European football manager, at 28 years old.

In June 2021, Will joined Ligue 1 side Stade de Reims as assistant coach to Oscar Garcia. In October 2022 he was installed as the club's new first team manager. He gained extensive media attention for being 30 years old at the time of his appointment and for leading Reims to an unbeaten streak of 19 matches.

Will left Reims earlier this year and now faces his next managerial challenge as the boss of fellow French side Lens.

Olly Harrison

Farmer and entrepreneur Olly Harrison is the face behind his own popular YouTube channel.

The daily videos, which he started in lockdown, provide a glimpse into the real-world challenges and triumphs of farming, marked by a touch of humour and diversification tales to fund his machinery and tractor addiction!

Olly's online presence reaches over 350,000 across his social channels, 110,000 of which are on YouTube. His 1500+ videos have been watched over 77 million times, where he shares insights, experiences, and challenges faced in the agricultural industry.

His content resonates with both farming enthusiasts and those curious about the intricacies of rural life. Never afraid to speak out about the industry, he achieved the DLG accolade of 'International Agricultural Influencer for YouTube' and was recognised as an NFU Community Farming Hero. His ability to explain the complexities of farming in straightforward language has made him a regular contributor across BBC channels, including BBC News and BBC Radio 4.

The farming business in 2024 has 14 different income streams, from 'dog walking fields', to chipping wood for biomass, to a merchandise operation that grossed over £100,000 in 2023 alone.

With a truly diverse range of activities, Olly, who left school at 16 having struggled with dyslexia, has grown his farming acreage from 180 to 1500. From traditional crops to sunflower mazes, office rental and holiday lets, Olly will always find a brilliant way to commercially exploit his land and assets. He promised himself that by the age of 40 he'd own a brand new combine harvester, and having achieved that he then decided to drive his Claas Lexion combine from John O'Groats to Land's End, all in the name of charity!

Olly is not just about farming, his dedication extends to charitable contributions that exceed £450,000 to date. From his tractor runs through Liverpool, to the YouTube channel's 'birthday bumper', many have benefited from his fundraising, including Alder Hey Children's Hospital and the North West Air Ambulance. As recognition of his continued hard work, Olly has been made a Deputy Lieutenant of Merseyside.

Olly is engaged to Charlotte and has three children. He's promised to leave one farm to each of them as he continues to build his farming empire. His unique blend of farming wisdom, humour, and community engagement has garnered him a dedicated following, where his impact extends beyond the fields, making him a notable figure not only in agriculture but also in charitable endeavours across the UK.

T-Levels

T-levels are new, government-backed, career focused qualifications – an alternative to A levels, apprenticeships and other 16 to 19 courses.

Students spend 80% of their time at College and 20% of their time developing the skills needed for the workplace, on a 45day industry placement. Myerscough College will be offering T-Levels in the subjects indicated opposite from September 2024, running alongside the established Level 3 Diploma programmes in each of the subjects indicated.

Students should initially apply for the current Level 3 Diploma options (via the website online application process) and then the Admissions Team and departments will contact you to discuss which route best meets your career aspirations.

Progression to university level degree courses

One of the great things about Myerscough is that, if you're looking to progress to a degree course at the end of your studies, we offer a choice of Foundation Degrees and Honours Degrees at our University Centre at the Preston campus.

Higher Education opportunities exist in each of our subject areas and don't forget that by studying for a two-year Level 3 qualification it provides the opportunity to progress to a degree course either here at Myerscough or many other colleges and universities.

Myerscough apprentice recognised in BIGGA Student Greenkeeper of the Year




A Myerscough College apprentice was recognised for the quality of his work in the annual Toro Student Greenkeeper of the Year awards.
